# The Newcomer's - Mt Joy, PA



The 5th Cambria Iron Conference & Iron Street Invitational at The Center for Metal Arts, 106 Iron Street, Johnstown, PA. September 20, 2025

This year's featured artist will be Jake James, who was the inaugural featured artist. Jake, the students for the Octagon Collaborative Sculpture Workshop and the Octagon Support Team will use the 3000# Chambersburg and/or the 4000# Niles Bement hammers in making the sculptural elements of this years design. I have attended the previous four conferences and the skill of the Octagon Team and the equipment use has improved each year, making this a unique experience for not only the participants but also the attendees.

In addition, the second Iron Street Invitational will be held in the CMA classroom during the Octagon work. Teams of two smiths will be provided a piece of material, access to a coal forge, class tooling and an anvil to create a piece from the same piece of starting stock. ## **Left or Right Handed Tongs**

One of the tools made during the class that I took with Anna Koplik at the Center for Metal Arts this past October was a pair of pick up type tongs that were then used to forge the hammer that was the other part of the class. During the discussion about putting together and fitting the tongs Anna brought up the topic of left or right-handed tongs. Since I was the only left handed student (again) in the class, it piqued my interest and whether it would make a difference in the use of tongs.

The basis of handed tongs is the rein held by your thumb is the top rein, supposedly providing better control during forging. If the reins are off set and parallel in the hand, handedness does not apply. I put my tongs together as left handed (held in the right hand, rein up at my thumb) and this arrangement seemed to provide better control. When I returned home, I looked through all my user tongs and others, and all were right handed, as are all the tongs in the CMA shop. While the handedness of the tongs has little effect on their functionality for me, I will pay attention to this when making my own, especially light tongs that are used for more finesse forgings where thumb control is useful.



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## **Historic Blacksmith Conservancy (HBC)**

I received this information from one of our members, Mark Scott. He is also a Board member of the Historic Blacksmith Conservancy (HBC), a 501 c(3) organization started two years ago by a former ABANA President and other former ABANA Board members. More information at - historicblacksmithconservancy.org -

"The mission of the HBC is to promote excellence in traditional blacksmithing in the United States. The Conservancy is a repository for works, materials, and tooling of present and past masters. From these historic examples we derive educational programming aimed at blacksmiths, metalworkers, architects, designers, the building trades, and the general public. Our goal is to promote the appreciation of design and craftsmanship, while training the next generation of smiths to build on our inherited legacy.

At the Yellin shop's closing in 1993 George Dixon was the head blacksmith. Dixon, an accomplished smith and historian by training, was deeply invested in the significance of the shop and its output. Beyond those items listed above, the volume of documents, drawings, pictures, tools, and samples was overwhelming. Dixon arranged with the Yellin family to become a custodian of large portions of the shop's important decorative tooling, photographs, and drawings. A further provision required Dixon to keep the materials together and to find a repository of this portion of the collection in his lifetime. In 2023, the Historic Blacksmith Conservancy negotiated an agreement for the purchase of the Yellin Tool Collection in order to eventually establish a learning center with the collection at its heart—a goal shared by Samuel Yellin.

On September 27th, 2024, George Dixon tragically perished in flooding related to Hurricane Helene that ravaged the region. His home was catastrophically destroyed, and his shop was severely damaged. Acutely

impacted by the disaster, his family sprang into action and salvaged nearly all of the important tools, drawings, and documents in George's possession at the time of his death.

The Historic Blacksmith Conservancy has renewed the purchase agreement with the Dixon family. We are confident in our ability to secure the collection for the posterity of our profession and our ability to eventually put it to use in the education of American Blacksmiths. We need your help. The cost of purchasing, transporting, and storing the collection is \$250,000. The Dixon family is reeling from the loss of George, and in desperate need of funds to rebuild their lives. We can provide relief through the purchase of the Yellin Tool Collection. We have a limited time window to make the purchase before the family might consider other means of monetizing the collection. Only as a community can we secure the Yellin Tool Collection. We invite you to contribute to this important and meaningful effort."
